We are a generous people who give our time and resources to the mission of God in the world.


We tithe as the means through which our community enjoys fiscal health so as to minister generously.

Sermon Reflection Guide

Luke 23.39-43

One of the criminals who were hanged there kept deriding him and saying, "Are you not the Messiah? Save yourself and us!" But the other rebuked him, saying, "Do you not fear God, since you are under the same sentence of condemnation? And we indeed have been condemned justly, for we are getting what we deserve for our deeds, but this man has done nothing wrong." Then he said, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." He replied, "Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in Paradise."

Question for Everyone

(1) Honestly I struggle to believe that there is life after death and that heaven is real. (10) I have no doubt whatsoever that heaven is real and then when I die I will be in Paradise with Jesus. Where are you on this range?

Our King from His Throne

"Today, you will be with me in Paradise." Seems like a rather overly-confident declaration from one who is about as far from Paradise as you can get. It's almost as if Jesus thinks he's the one calling the shots from his rather vulnerable predicament. Jesus speaks like a king granting forgiveness, pardon and Paradise in this place of extreme cruelty; which is precisely the point. The

crucifixion is a conspiracy of supreme evil, and it is the enthronement of our king at the very same time. How might reading the crucifixion through the interpretive lens of enthronement help us better understand the crucifixion?

Mocked

"The electric chair, when it was still used, was almost always used for executing the lowest class of criminal, a majority of them black, with no powerful connections or other resources. Similarly, the Romans virtually never used the cross for executing people who had occupied high positions, and never for Roman Citizens. . . . Crucifixion as a means of execution in the Roman Empire had as its express purpose the elimination of victims from consideration as members of the human race. . . . It was meant to indicate to all who might be toying with subversive ideas that crucified persons were not of the same species as either the executioners or the spectators and were therefore not only expendable but also deserving of ritualized extermination . . . Crucifixion was cleverly designed—we might say diabolically designed—to be an almost theatrical enactment of the sadistic and inhumane impulses that lie within human beings. According to the Christian gospel, the Son of God voluntarily and purposefully absorbed all of that, drawing it into himself" (Fleming Ruledge, The Crucifixion: Understanding the Death of Jesus Christ). Response?

"Today, you will be with me in Paradise."

The scandal of these words is revealed not only in their content and context but by the recipient of these words. These are not good men. They are not wrongly accused. If the law of the land is "eye for eye" and "tooth for tooth," these guys are right where they belong. Perpetrators of violence are now the victims of violence. Paradise is offered to this common criminal. The King of the Jews ushers a broken, hopeless, soon to be exterminated criminal into his kingdom. Response? What does this moment teach us about the reign of God in Christ?
