Hosea 2.12-13, 28-28

Yet even now, says the Lord,
return to me with all your heart,
with fasting, with weeping, and with mourning;
rend your hearts and not your clothing.
Return to the Lord, your God,

and relents from punishing.

#### Then afterward

### **Question for Everyone:**

(1) I blame God when bad things happened. (10) I blame myself when bad things happened. Where are you on this spectrum?

#### Locusts

Hard times have a way of getting our attention, God's megaphone as C.S. Lewis famously asserted. Life has a way of getting our attention. The question is, will I choose the way of discouragement, cynicism and disillusionment or will I choose the way of hope and optimism and the courage to trust God in the midst of anxious times? (How do you normally respond to trouble?)

### What To Do with Judgment?

While I am not the least bit reluctant to name God's presence in the midst of turmoil, I am extremely reluctant to name God's judgment in the catastrophes of life. (Do you share this reluctance? How do you square this reluctance with the Hebrew Prophet's propensity to name calamity as God's judgment?)

#### You Have No One to Blame but Yourself

The Hebrew prophet served the people of God during three epochs of their history: before exile, during exile, after exile. Their message was essentially the same during all three epochs: catastrophe is coming/has come and you have no one to blame but yourselves. (When bad things happen to you, do you sense the need to cast blame? Are you more likely to blame yourself or the other? Do you ever blame God?)
