We help the vulnerable among us.


We go into the world offering Jesus' invitation to gather at

## Sermon Reflection Guide

### Psalm 121

I lift up my eyes to the hills—from where will my help come?
My help comes from the Lord, who made heaven and earth.
He will not let your foot be moved; he who keeps you will not slumber.

He who keeps Israel
will neither slumber nor sleep.
The Lord is your keeper;
the Lord is your shade at your right hand.
The sun shall not strike you by day,
nor the moon by night.
The Lord will keep you from all evil;
he will keep your life.
The Lord will keep
your going out and your coming in
from this time on and forevermore.

## **Genesis 12.1-4**

Now the Lord said to Abram, "Go from your country and your kindred and your father's house to the land that I will show you. I will make of you a great nation, and I will bless you, and make your name great, so that you will be a blessing. I will bless those who bless you, and the one who curses you I will curse; and in you all the families of the earth shall be blessed." So Abram went, as the Lord had told him; and Lot went with him. Abram was seventy-five years old when he departed from Haran.

## John 3.1-3

Now there was a Pharisee named Nicodemus, a leader of the Jews. He came to Jesus by night and said to him, "Rabbi, we know that you are a teacher who has come from God; for no one can do these signs that you do apart from the presence of God." Jesus answered him, "Very truly, I tell you, no one can see the kingdom of God without being born from above."

## Gathering to Worship

The first movement of corporate worship is gathering. It began before you got into this sanctuary. You had to prepare for the journey. You had to, at the very least, get out of bed. For others, the journey was more arduous. You had to get others ready, not just yourself. Talk about the ways you prepare for and observe Sabbath time on Sunday.

# Christianity as Pilgrimage

Christians know they are on a pilgrimage. A pilgrim is on an intentional journey of transformation because their future destination is transforming the present moment. Talk about pilgrimage as a metaphor for the Christian faith. How does our destination transform our journey here and now? Have you ever taken an actual pilgrimage? Ever considered it?

# A Song for Pilgrims

Psalm 121 is a song for pilgrims. You can't be a pilgrim without a destination in mind and without companions on the way. The people who originally sang Psalm 121 knew their destination and with whom they were traveling, up to Jerusalem, up to the Temple, up to the location of God's presence. Psalm 121 is a Song of Ascent, a part of a playlist for pilgrims on their way to worship. What is on your playlist? What are the psalms, hymns, spiritual songs, or contemporary songs that shape your Christian pilgrimage?

## The Hills

Between the sojourner and the destination are hills that pose a threat, bandits, or wild animals; the pilgrim's journey will take them through uncertain terrain. Are there hills on the horizon of your life that pose a threat or cause anxiety? What songs might you sing to prepare?

#### Where Would You Go?

If you were to make a pilgrimage to a place where God made God's presence known to you through protection or provision, where would you go? Tell the story.
