We help the vulnerable among us.


We go into the world offering Jesus' invitation to gather at

Sermon Reflection Guide

Psalm 95

O come, let us sing to the Lord; let us make a joyful noise to the rock of our salvation! Let us come into his presence with thanksgiving; let us make a joyful noise to him with songs of praise! For the Lord is a great God,

and a great King above all gods. In his hand are the depths of the earth; the heights of the mountains are his also. The sea is his, for he made it, and the dry land, which his hands have formed. O come, let us worship and bow down, let us kneel before the Lord, our Maker! For he is our God. and we are the people of his pasture, and the sheep of his hand. O that today you would listen to his voice! Do not harden your hearts, as at Meribah, as on the day at Massah in the wilderness, when your ancestors tested me, and put me to the proof, though they had seen my work. For forty years I loathed that generation and said, "They are a people whose hearts go astray, and they do not regard my ways." Therefore in my anger I swore, "They shall not enter my rest."

Exodus 17.1-7

From the wilderness of Sin the whole congregation of the Israelites journeyed by stages, as the Lord commanded. They camped at Rephidim, but there was no water for the people to drink. The people quarreled with Moses, and said, "Give us water to drink." Moses said to them, "Why do you quarrel with me? Why do you test the Lord?" But the people thirsted there for water; and the people complained against Moses and said, "Why did you bring us out of Egypt, to kill us and our children and livestock with thirst?" So Moses cried out to the Lord, "What shall I do with this people? They are almost ready to stone me." The Lord said to Moses, "Go on ahead of the people, and take some of the elders of Israel with you; take in your hand the staff with which you struck the Nile, and go. I will be standing there in front of you on the rock at Horeb. Strike the rock, and water will come out of it, so that the people may drink." Moses did so, in the sight of the elders of Israel. He called the place Massah and Meribah, because the Israelites quarreled and tested the Lord, saying, "Is the Lord among us or not?"

Joyful Worship

Worshiping the God of Jesus Christ requires joyful singing with loud alleluias. Christian corporate worship is the only place where the word "alleluia" is appropriate. Why? Because of the God we worship. Alleluia means "God be praised!" It is an exuberant confession of praise. Are you a joyful practitioner of the Christian faith? Or has cynicism muted your "alleluias"?

Church

God has created a people to bear God's image and share God's limitless love. This people is called Church. To be the Church is to be the kind of people who so love and forgive and care that Jesus is the only explanation for such crazy behavior. Response?

Joy in the Days of the Coronavirus

I want you to know that no matter how this Coronavirus narrative unfolds, we will do all we can to keep our people gathered, either virtually on line or perhaps in smaller groups, maybe in smaller gatherings in the sanctuary. No matter how this unfolds, we aren't going to cancel being the Church. We won't let the virus diminish our joy or our mission. Talk about the anxiety you may be experiencing during the current pandemic. Are you a non anxious presence? Why? Why not? What's the difference between panic and appropriate precaution?

Rest

We can sleep because our God never sleeps. We can rest because our God never stops caring for us. Are you experiencing the "rest" of God? What might you need to do or stop doing to enter Divine rest?
