We follow Jesus into the world as His healing presence.


We help the vulnerable among us.

## Acts 17.22-34

Then Paul stood in front of the Areopagus and said, "Athenians, I see how extremely religious you are in every way. For as I went through the city and looked carefully at the objects of your worship, I found among them an altar with the inscription, 'To an unknown god.' What therefore you worship as unknown, this I proclaim

to you. The God who made the world and everything in it, he who is Lord of heaven and earth, does not live in shrines made by human hands, nor is he served by human hands, as though he needed anything, since he himself gives to all mortals life and breath and all things. From one ancestor he made all nations to inhabit the whole earth, and he allotted the times of their existence and the boundaries of the places where they would live, so that they would search for God and perhaps grope for him and find him—though indeed he is not far from each one of us. For 'In him we live and move and have our being'; as even some of your own poets have said, 'For we too are his offspring. 'Since we are God's offspring, we ought not to think that the deity is like gold, or silver, or stone, an image formed by the art and imagination of mortals. While God has overlooked the times of human ignorance, now he commands all people everywhere to repent, because he has fixed a day on which he will have the world judged in righteousness by a man whom he has appointed, and of this he has given assurance to all by raising him from the dead." When they heard of the resurrection of the dead, some scoffed; but others said, "We will hear you again about this." At that point Paul left them. But some of them joined him and became believers, including Dionysius the Areopagite and a woman named Damaris, and others with them.

# Saul of Tarsus: a Zealous Man

Saul not only watched but helped the blood thirsty crowd as they proceeded to stone Stephen to death. The mob laid their coats at the feet of Saul for safe keeping in order to, presumably, have full mobility when it came to hurling stones at Stephen's head. There, stood the zealous, young, Torah student watching Stephen die a gruesome death. It was the right thing, the righteous

thing as far as Saul was concerned. Jerusalem needed cleansed of Stephen's poisonous message about Jesus and the resurrection. Think about the word "zeal." Is zeal good or bad? Would you consider yourself a zealous person? For what are you zealous?

# Saul of Tarsus: a Religious Fundamentalist

Saul was, what we might call today, a religious fundamentalist extremist, not unlike a terrorist. He was sort of the Osama bin Laden of Ancient Near Eastern Judaism bent on jihad, a holy war against the people of the Way, as Christians were called back then. Think about Paul's former life. Is there a good kind of religious fundamentalism? If Saul can become Paul, what are the implications for loved ones in your life who are not yet Christian?

## Saul Meets Jesus

Jesus is all-encompassing and all-consuming for those who follow him. Jesus sets the parameters for life. Jesus offers us his own set of best practices when it comes to being human. If your confession is: "Jesus is Lord," (the common confession for all Christians) then Jesus' best practices become your practices. While we may not be called to the kind of vocation to which Paul was called, all Christians are called to the same depth of love and passionate devotion. Jesus evokes that from his followers. Paul said "I am crucified with Christ." Dietrich Bonhoeffer said, "When Christ calls a man, he bids him come and die." This is just Christianity 101. Talk about the ebb and flow of your devotion to Christ.

# Metamorphosis

Paul saw the glory of Yahweh, the God of Israel, "in the face of Jesus Christ" (1 Cor. 4.6). Only Easter can explain a man like the Apostle Paul, a man who remained absolutely loyal to the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob and completely transformed in his understanding of what it meant to be faithful to this same God. Have you ever had your mind changed? Have you ever been deeply committed to an opinion only to learn you were wrong? Tell the story.
