Sermon Reflection Guide

Romans 15.13-19

May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that you may abound in hope by the power of the Holy Spirit. I myself feel confident about you, my brothers and sisters, that you yourselves are full of goodness, filled with all knowledge, and able to instruct one another. Nevertheless on some points I have written to you rather boldly by way of reminder, because of the grace given me by God to be a minister of Christ Jesus to the Gentiles in the priestly service of the gospel of God, so that the offering of the Gentiles may be acceptable, sanctified by the Holy Spirit. In Christ Jesus, then, I have reason to boast of my work for God. For I will not venture to speak of anything except what Christ has accomplished through me to win obedience from the Gentiles, by word and deed, by the power of signs and wonders, by the power of the Spirit of God, so that from Jerusalem and as far around as Illyricum I have fully proclaimed the good news of Christ.

Question for Everyone

(1) I am often discouraged and easily given over to despair. (10) I am always encouraged and live in constant hope. Where are you on this range?

Hope

Up until recently, I had never been especially fond of the word "hope." The word "hope" always seemed like a sort of opiate that people of faith use to survive when things are really bad. I have even sensed, at times, that hope is used to encourage a passive quietism when prophetical zeal would be more appropriate. How do you respond to the word "hope?" How do you know when to choose between remaining still or engaging prophetically?

You Are Not a Pawn

We aren't pawns in a cosmic battle. We aren't passive observers of a world on fire. We are co-collaborators, co-conspirators with none other than Jesus the Christ. We are swept up into the dance of the Holy Trinity so as to be a part of God's cosmic transformation of all things

by God's grace and our cooperation with divine grace. How do you collaborate and conspire with Jesus to bring His healing?

Hope as Eschatology

Hope is as eschatological word; meaning, hope is about trusting in God's future to the degree that we lean into God's future now. That is to say, hope has a future orientation but a present daily response. Hope is a disciplined posture, a way of navigating in this world. By this definition do you live by hope?

Hope is Not a Good Luck Charm

What one must know about Christian hope is that it is not an excuse for passivity. Neither is it the assurance that all will transpire free of hardship or suffering or that all will go according to plan. As a matter of fact, living by hope means doing the right thing when things are not going according to plan. Authentic hope is impervious to contemporary circumstances. Response?

Paul's Boasting

N.T. Wright says, "before Paul began his missionary journeys, neither Asia Minor nor Greece had heard of Jesus of Nazareth; by the time he was writing this letter, there were little communities all over that part of Caesar's empire (and it was a very significant part of Caesar's empire) in which Jesus was being celebrated as the risen Messiah, the world's true Lord. That is in itself, an astonishing achievement, and Paul must have known it." I'm given to neither confidence nor boasting. But there is a kind of boasting that Christians are allowed, boasting in what God has accomplished through them. In the last few years what has God accomplished through us?
